Dear Colleague:

Once again the College of Humanities and the Honors Program invite you to take part in the program that past students and former faculty so often cite not only as one of their favorite and most memorable but also one of their very most valuable and life-changing experiences at BYU: the International Cinema program. This year we're doing something we've never done before--and yet, considering the distinctive nature of BYU and its community, it's really quite surprising that we haven't: call this fall semester our "genealogy" semester, if you'd like, for I've grouped all of the films around a theme that might be of more interest to us than it would be to any other university around--Family, Memory, and the Past. And look what a rich offering of old favorites and terrific new premieres we've got lined up:

- Sep 2-6: As anyone knows who has seen these most recent remakes of two of the most famous novels of childhood, *The Secret Garden* and *Little Women* are simply two very excellent movies—and not just for children or women but absolutely everyone. If you've missed them, or if just want to savor them again, these 1990's versions are both faithful to their sources and extremely well done, from the fine cast of *Little Women* (Winona Ryder, Clare Danes, Susan Sarandon, etc.) to the first-rate direction by Agnieska Holland of the beloved classic *Secret Garden*. Family, memory, the past—and filmmaking at its finest.
- Sep 9-13: Two BYU favorites: My Father's Glory and My Mother's Castle are two very endearing films lovingly depicting novelist Marcel Pagnol's nostalgic reminiscences of his childhood around the turn of the century in the south of France.
- Sep 16-20: Cinema Paradiso, of course, is another of those films beloved of audiences everywhere—and it's also memories of boyhood in a sweeter and more simple time and place, in this case a small Italian seacoast town where a little boy is enchanted by the local movie theater and mentored by the old man who runs the projector. With it is a much lesser known, but wonderful little film called Petra's Wreath about a matronly Yugoslavian woman and her memories of her family and youth in days gone by. See this, by all means, if you're already familiar with Cinema Paradiso.
- Sep 23-27: What luck--and what a joy! Many will be excited to see that we're bringing the wonderful mother/daughter film, Joy Luck Club, back to the wide-screen once again. There are no less than 8 different stories interwoven here--four from the past (the mothers) and four in the present (the daughters). An excellent movie experience that everyone should know. And with it is Reunion, a touching film--mainly in English but set in Germany--as an older man (Jason Robards, Jr.) goes back to his homeland hoping to track down the friend he had been so close to in his boyhood before they were separated by WWII.
- 4: An absolute "must-see" this week. Whenever one thinks of youth and World War II, the haunting image of Anne Frank almost inevitably comes to mind. And what a timely thing it is that a brand-new knock-out documentary of Anne Frank emerged this year--with not only touching photographs and bits of old home movies from the time, but also great new interviews with the handful of people--still living at this moment, but sadly not for long--who had known the girl Anne Frank and/or lived with her in Holland. Anne Frank Remembered is a most wonderful document--and Kenneth Branagh and Glenn Close provide the narration. With it is the German film Sterne--a touching story of a soldier who tries to hide a Jewish girl in order to save her. The third film is Muddy River, a fairly recent film from Japan, also purposely shot in black and white to give it the nostalgic feeling of old movies from the 40's. A touching memory film of lost friendship.
- Oct 7-11: Jean de Florette and Manon of the Spring have to be two of the most widely loved foreign films ever and how great it is that they fit our theme so nicely, being all about family, memory, and past, covering not only two different time periods but even a third bygone era which we only learn about little by little through the bittersweet memories of these rich and memorable characters (created by the novelist Marcel Pagnol real-life memories we got to experience back in the second week of the semester). The first film is good, the second is even better, and the two together make for a most exhilarating and memorable experience.
- Oct 14-18: The relatively new Italian, Fiorile, has only played at IC once, but we've had such a lot of requests for it, it's time already to bring it back, especially since-you guessed it—it's all about family, memory, and the past. Gorgeously filmed and intriguingly put together, this story of several generations in Italy and the family "curse" which continues to haunt them is well worth seeing. Playing with it is a German film, Marianne and Juliane, about two sisters who, although close during childhood, grow up to follow two radically different paths, yet eventually find their lives inextricably tangled nonetheless. The third film this week is Vassa, a very fine Russian film about a family run by a domineering matriarch.
- Oct 21-25: Letters from the East is a nice new film in English and Estonian that hardly anyone knows about. It's about a concert violinist (played by Ewa Fröling, the young mother of Fanny and Alexander), who decides she must travel to Estonia to try to find-or at least to find out about-her Estonian mother she has never really known. Equally intriguing is The Song of Exile, about a young Chinese girl bent on discovering the truth about her Japanese mother and a phase of that mother's life that remains in mystery. Our third film, Malou, also deals with a daughter's search to find out more about her mother—this time, a German girl travels to Argentina in an attempt to unravel her mother's past.
- Oct 28-Nov 1: Nicely lighted, beautifully photographed, and excellently acted, the Spanish film *El Sur* (by the director of *Spirit of the Beehive*) is a subtle and artistic exploration of a young girl's longing to understand her secretive father and what seems to be his obsession with the films of a certain movie actress from the past. And with it we're premiering a gorgeous new film from Hawaii, *Picture Bride*, in which the writer/director of the film chronicles the plight of her Japanese grandmother when she, like many others around the turn of the century, was brought to the islands as a kind of mail-order bride for an older Japanese worker who'd come over earlier. An audience favorite at the Sundance Film Festival, this is one you shouldn't miss.
- Nov 4-8: Nirror is a fascinating art film by director, Andrei Tarkovsky. Not for those who demand a linear plot with a beginning, middle, and end, this experimental exercise in artistry is one in which the world's quintessential art-film director dazzlingly mixes memories of his mother and of his childhood in rural Russia as if they were shifting and shimmering bits of broken glass in a cinematic kaleidoscope. With it is an excellent film from Egypt called Night of Counting the Years. The film might seem slow-paced at first, but stay with it, for it deals beautifully, in carefully composed shots, with a boy's conflict between his family—who for years have been surviving by looting the riches in some ancient graves they've discovered—and the archeologists and museums who would want to preserve these treasures. Finally, a third film: The Jew from Portugal deals with the situation of a real—and very famous—writer of satirical comedies especially for puppets during the 18th century who found himself imprisoned and tortured by Inquisitors when it was discovered that his family was Jewish rather than Christian.
- Nov 11-15: If at first you wonder what Kenneth Branagh's stunning and star-studded new 4-hour *Hamlet* is doing among all these family/memory/past films, think about it: a young Danish prince is visited by the ghost of his father, the former king, who, claiming to been killed by his own brother (the boy's uncle) who then usurped his crown and married his wife (the boy's mother), urges his son to get revenge--and the boy must decide (1) if his uncle is truly a murderer, (2) if his own mother then was in on the horrible deed, and, perhaps above all, (3) whether his father's ghost is an emmissary sent from heaven--or from hell. Okay?

Go and enjoy Branagh's lush new version with first-rate performances by Branagh as Hamlet, Julie Christie as his mother, Kate Winslet as Ophelia, and Derek Jacobi as the usurper/uncle, and try to avoid playing "name-that-face" as the likes of Jack Lemmon, Charlton Heston, Billy Crystal, and Robin Williams flit by in minor roles.

- Nov 18-22: Three good films—but my pick of the week would probably be the excellent new Mongolian Tale which we're premiering in this area. This exotic love story (not totally unlike Wuthering Heights) is a real charmer that will not only fascinate you but is sure to touch your heart as well. The quietly elegant The Makioka Sisters, based on the famous Japanese novel by Junichiro Tanizaki, is a gentle look at the plight of a family's four daughters set against the backdrop of the changing of the seasons. Playing with these two is also the very impressionistic and poetic Ukrainian film, Shadows of Forgotten Ancestors by the daring experimentalist Sergei Paradjanov.
- Nov 24-26: Two more IC premieres this Thanksgiving week--and note that Lam highly recommending that you make time during this busy week to see the wonderful new 80-minute documentary Martha and Ethel in which two friends, now adults, reminisce over the what now seems to be the importance of the person who actually "raises" you, since each had had a nanny, one a black woman and one German immigrant, when they were little girls. This is a tear-jerker and a heartwarmer in the very best sense--a little genealogical gem that just simply shouldn't be missed. We had a horrendous time tracking down a copy of this excellent but not-widely-known 1994 film, so be sure to see it now or perhaps you never will. With it is The Last Klezmer, another new documentary--this one about an old Jewish musician, an immigrant from Poland during WWII, finally visits the Old Country and tries to find the spots where he had once lived and played the heartfelt Jewish music that is now appears to be a dying art form.
- Dec 2-6: Children of Nature is another of our premieres this semester. From Iceland, this one depicts an old man and old woman who wander away from a rest home in their attempt to love and live as a couple away from their children and anyone else who have taken it upon themselves to decide their fate for them. Playing also is Sweet Hours from Spain--Carlos Saura's sympathetic look at a man's memories of his childhood and the tender feelings he had had for his mother and how now, as an adult, he has transferred those feelings to a young woman who closely resembles her (both parts nicely played, incidentally, by the same lovely actress).
- Dec 9-12: Completing the semester is the beautifully evocative *Valentina* from Spain--all about childhood and friendship and love as remembered by an adult whose memories of days gone by are what keep him alive--but it's only, unfortunately, in Spanish--without any subtitles. Sorry.

So-with this line-up, how can you stand to not get involved? Make your life richer by taking advantage of these free (two of you admitted by just showing your faculty/admin card) films drawn from the "cream of the crop" from all around the world. They're shown from Tuesday through Saturday (with special showings occasionally even on Monday afternoon in one or instances; watch the schedules) and from mid-afternoon until late at night. The films are always in the comfortable auditorium in 250 Kimball Tower, with its plush seats, large screen, and brand-new stereophonic sound. Weekly flyers with each program's showtimes can be found in boxes throughout campus, or by simply calling 378-size. Enjoy this "genealogy" semester of great films!
